Recertification Tracking Form New Jersey Certified Recycling Professionals For the Period January 1, 2023 - December 31, 2024

All Certified Recycling Professionals (CRP's) must complete a total of twenty (20) credits (hours) of recertification credits over a two (2) year period. Of this total, a <u>minimum</u> of six (6) <u>must be classroom or course-based training</u>, the remaining fourteen (14) hours can be earned through <u>pre-approved</u> meetings, conferences or other technical training. It is <u>your</u> responsibility to maintain a record of the courses you attend and forward that information to the Rutgers/New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station Office of Continuing Professional Education (OCPE) when you have fulfilled the requirements for recertification. The form must be returned to Carol Broccoli (<u>carolbr@rutgers.edu</u>) at OCPE within one (1) month of the end of the recertification period to document recertification efforts during the prior two years.



After the dust settles, those decluttering their home often find themselves with a large pile of unwanted hardcover books that they don't know how to handle. Thankfully, there are reuse and recycling options available that can keep hardcover books out of the trash, as

Check with your local library to see if they are accepting donations of used books. Most libraries accept such donations.

Non-profit organizations may also be interested in receiving free books. Check with non-profit organizations in your area.

Look for local organizations in the business of accepting used and unwanted books, which are then redistributed to those looking

If no reuse options are available to you, rip off the hardcovers from your unwanted books and place the paper pages in your curbside recycling bucket, bin or cart (throw the hardcovers in the trash). While most, if not all, recycling programs can accept the paper used in books, it is always a good idea to first check with your local recycling coordinator before putting this paper in your curbside recycling bucket, bin or cart.

- Utility programs will be reevaluated in 2024.







E-Waste

Covered Electronic Devices (CEDs) are required to be collected without additional fees

RE: Electronic Waste Management Act N.J.S.A. 13:1E-99.94 et. seq. (Act or E-waste law)
Clarification of charges and requirements that may be imposed on e-waste collection
facilities

Dear Covered Electronic Device Manufacturer, Authorized Recycler, County Official:

It has once again come to the attention of the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (Department) that some Authorized Recyclers working on behalf of one or more manufacturers have been assessing fees and/or imposing requirements, or intending to assess fees or impose requirements, in connection with collecting covered electronic devices (CEDs) pursuant to a manufacturer's e-waste collection plan. Such fees and requirements include but are not limited to handling fees requiring the purchase of packaging materials and/or requiring the collection sites to provide services at the collection site beyond what is required by state or federal law.

Be advised that imposition of any fees/costs or requirements on e-waste collection sites beyond those specified in the Electronic Waste Management Act and its implementing regulations, or beyond those specified in state and federal standards for Universal Waste management, is prohibited and may not be included in contracts or agreements between manufacturers and/or their Authorized Recyclers and collection facilities.

The Electronic Waste Management Act requires all manufacturers of CEDs to "implement and finance the collection, transportation and recycling of" used CEDs. (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-99.96(e)(4); N.J.S.A. 13:1E-99.103(e)(5)). In accordance with this requirement, Department regulations provide that each manufacturer or group of manufacturers must implement, at its own expense, a plan for the collection, transportation, and recycling of covered electronic devices for which it has a collection obligation. N.J.A.C. 7:26A-13.4(f).

Pursuant to Electronic Waste Management Act regulations, the only requirement applicable to collection sites that collect CEDs is that they comply with the Department's requirements for Universal Waste handlers at N.J.A.C. 7:26A-7.4 and 7.5, which, with limited exceptions, incorporate federal regulations on Universal Waste. (N.J.A.C. 7:26A-13.11 (b)). N.J.A.C. 7:26A-7.4(b) and 7.5(b) state in relevant part that handlers of universal waste shall "manage consumer electronics in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal

Price Increases for 2024

HHW

• Disposal for Latex paint, Out-of-County, and VSQG customers increased from \$1.50/lb to \$2.00/lb

Vegetative Waste

- Wood Chips increased from \$3/cy to \$4/cy
- Lake weed increased from \$5/cy to \$6/cy
- Brush (loose) increased from \$6.50/cy to \$7.50/cy
- Leaves (loose) and grass (loose) no change for Municipal customers
- ALL compacted materials increased by \$2/cy
- \$2/cy surcharge for ALL bagged material (bags will be phased out and no longer accepted in two years)

Rental Trucks Are Not Permitted At Transfer Stations



Commercial Vehicles

State law requires that all commercial vehicles must have current NJDEP hauling decals on them in order to use the transfer stations. Any vehicle with commercial plates will not be permitted to dump without proper decals.

Resident

The only exception to having an NJDEP decal on your truck is if you are delivering your own waste self-generated from your primary residence only.

Residents looking to dump household garbage at the transfer station must use a vehicle with passenger plate registration that has a gross vehicle weight of less than 9,000 lbs. If the vehicle is being used in combination with a trailer, it may not exceed 16,000 lbs total.

Do not rent any sized vehicle from U-Haul, Lowes, Home Depot, Ryder, etc., and expect to be able to use the transfer stations with them. As both rental vehicles are considered commercial, without the proper decals they are not permitted to dump at the transfer station.

Additionally, all secondary and/or rental properties are considered a business and their solid waste needs to be disposed of as a business. Any resident having an out-of-county license needs to show a utility bill or municipal tax paperwork in order to dump.

NJDEP Decals at MCMUA's Transfer Station




The Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) requires solid waste transporters to register with the NJDEP and obtain vehicle decals prior to picking up or disposing of waste in New Jersey.

To properly display decals:

Using letters and numbers at least **3 inches in height**, paint or affix the letters "NJDEP", your unique NJDEP number, and the carrying capacity (gallons or cubic yards) to your vehicle or container.

Then, **PERMANENTLY** affix the decal to a clean surface. Magnets or taped decals will be confiscated. This information must be displayed on the **DRIVER SIDE** of the vehicle in the area indicated by the arrows below so that it will be visible to the operator of the waste facility. Your registered company name (official company name that was registered with the State of New Jersey, Division of Commercial Recordings) must also be displayed in at least 3 inch letters.
